**PUBLIC ARCHIVES  
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Indicates that David Grosvenor of Conestown &c &c  
To witness that David Grosvenor of Conestown &c &c  
Loyalist one Ruth Sattie and said that  
he was well acquainted with the late  
Nicholas, James and John Sattie Jr all  
a & Loyalists and all of the township of  
Conestown. That they were residents of  
the United States at the time of the Revolutionary  
War and joined the Royal Standard Army  
and all became aware in the following Corps  
viz Nicholas in Col. Peters, Corp. James  
in the Royal Rangiers, and John Sattie Jr  
in the Loyal Corps. Dependent further Sattie  
that they were brothers, and that they all  
came into this Province in 1783 or 1784  
and that Nicholas is now dead now  
living a few years of Eighty years of age.

Lake was a U.S. Loyalist, that said John Lake  
is now dead, that he was aged Sixty eight years at  
the time of his death, and died in the 9<sup>th</sup> of November  
one thousand eight hundred and twenty eight, that  
he came into the Province of Upper Canada in the  
year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and  
Eighty three or four, and continued to live in  
Ernestown in Said Province until his death,  
that he served during the Revolutionary War, between  
the years 1776 and 1783 as a soldier in the  
Corps called Tryon's Corp, and was reduced or  
Discharged in the year 1783, - and this deponent  
further saith, that the said John Lake did  
his duty in the Militia during the late war  
with the United States from 1812 to 1815, - and  
that he faithfully maintained his loyalty to  
the British Crown, until his death, - that the  
Names and ages of his children are as

May it please your Excellency - we  
whose names are h[er]e subscribed are  
the sons of John Lake late of Ernest  
Town & a L.C. Loyalist. That your petitions  
have been for many years endeavouring  
to learn the reason why the name of  
their father was suspended from the list  
of L.C. Loyalists. That your petitions  
were frequently promised by the several  
Inspectors General of the Province. That  
this disease should be rectified if they  
permitted affidavits of his having been  
a L.C. Loyalist. That they have now  
they have ever met with such obstacles  
and difficulties the several eyes on  
the matter and said if your petitions  
will show that the eye of the father  
at the time of the suspension would have  
~~enabled him to detect and to identify~~  
in that office show his service -  
at this point appears to us to you  
from the time when about 34 or  
the soldiers of that day are dead, it is  
almost impossibility to prove



The name of John Lake Junr., supposed to be the Father of these Petitioners appears on the U.E. list, with the remark "Suspended": attached thereto since 1802 or 1804.

The evidence adduced in support of the claim states, that he served in Jefrappi's Corps between the years 1776 & 1783, & was discharged in the year 1783 - and that he was aged 68 years at the time of his death in the year 1828.

His name is not however found on the Roll of that Corps, listed in this Office, when reduced in the year 1783, at which time it is stated he was discharged - now is it very clear what his age was at the period of the peace in 1783, whether under or over 21 years.. being under age at that time, was a reason acted on by the Govt. in 1810, for excluding from the U.E. list.

It is alleged in this Petition that it is almost an impossibility to procure the testimony demanded by the Inspector Genl's Dept., & that the impediments thrown in the way of U.E. claims were not offered formerly - it may therefore be fairly asked, why was not this claim long ago established, when proper & substantial evidence in all its bearings was to be obtained? - the inference is, that good reasons existed for not admitting the claim, & that the Government cannot reasonably be expected now to allow these claims to Land Scrip, to a considerable amount, on doubtful grounds.
