



Makes Big Volu By CLIFF McINTYRE A youngster's vow, made over 60 years ago while sitting at his grandmother's feet, "that my people should be remembered,"

became a reality last year. Claud Nelson McMillan, the youngster, has climaxed over a half century of research with the publication of the book "A History of My Family and Yours." The Rev. Mr. McMillan, a retired Methodist minister, is the father of Mrs. Eric Peterson, a former resident here.

The book is a genenological history of five basic families, the Wood, Cramton, Congdon, Mc-Millann and Lake families. In tracing the Lake family tree the Rev. Mr. McMillan devoted several pages to the branch now living in northeastern Indiana.

The Hoosier families are descendants of Thomas Lake, one of the original five families in the study. They became residents of northeastern Indiana through Nathan Lake who left Connecticut with a family of eight children in the year 1834 and journeyed by boat down the Erie Canal to Maumee City.

From Maumee City Nathan Lake, a farmer and lumberman, traveled by wagon with his family to LaGrange, where they settled for a few years on a farm. Later they settled on a farm near Fort Wayne. Here the whole family worked at farming and on the Toledo Wabash Canal being built at that time. There are now several hundred descendants of Nathan Lake living in northeastern Indiana.

By the same token, the Rev. Mr. McMillan's five original families eventually expanded to include 5,000 families-all indexed in his book.

#### Idea From Childhood

The idea for a Herculean project such as this came when McMillan was a little boy listening to his grandmother tell stories about his forbears. From that time on he collected data whenever he could. About 10 years ago, after 41 years as a Methodist minister, the Rev. Mr. McMillan suffered a heart attack. His sons took him with them to California to die, "But I wouldn't do it," the Rev. Mr. McMillan, who was in Fort Wayne last week, stated. "I felt I had to work on my book to stay alive," he said.

Casning in his life insurance, property and just about everything else he had, he started to work full-time on his book. Since then he has traveled over a half million miles all over the United States, by car and bus, spent \$1,000 on postage alone, and searched in courthouses in every state in the Union and Canada to round out his information.

Last year at the age of 81, Wayside Press of California published the 1,000 page-plus volume.

#### PREFACE

When we began with the idea of "A HISTORY OF MY PEOPLE," it involved only going back on the record of my people to the grand, and great grand parents. That is, those whom the writer had known, or known intimately about. In this venture we were greatly encouraged by our Mother who had a wonderful mind and memory, and the stories heard from her aged Mother who had her home in ours during the writer's youth.

From this grandmother we had stories of the trip by a raft down the Alleghaney to the Ohio, to the Mississippi, up to the Rock River, and up the Rock River to northern Illinois, where they were to make their future home.

From an Aunt of my Father, Rachel Lake-Peck, who lived near us in eastern Iowa. She lived to a great age and almost to the last her mind was clear, and she could recall many items distinctly, as the death of John and Margaret Snider-Lake, at Ernestown, Ontario, in the home of her Father John Jacob Lake, in 1835.

These incidents of our youth gave the incentive to know more about the people of our families, whose blood flowed through my own veins. So that in mature life, as we had opportunity, returning to the old home at Wyoming, Iowa, to visit our Mother and this aged aunt, we made copious notes about the family. So this work really began many years ago, and has had some consideration through many years.

Our original purpose was only to go back as far as the great grandparents, but being favored with opportunity for much travel, an dthus opportunity to add to our store of data about the various families, our plans broadened. Then we learned of "A Genealogy of the Lake Family," by Dr. Arthur Adams and Sarah Risley, and still later of "The Lake Family," by Devereaux Lake. These served to sharpen our interest, especially in The Lake Family, my Father's Mother's family, who was a descendant of John and Margaret Snider Lake, of Ernest Town, Ontario.

We were further encouraged in our quest by Mrs. Millie Titus, of Tucson, Ariz., who was making a study of The Lake Family, and who assured me that in following through Daniel and William Lake, I was on the wrong track. She loaned me data, had from various sources, showing that the line of John Lake, of Ernest Town, Ontario, ran from Nicholas Lake, of Somerset and Middlesex Counties, in New Jersey.

The National Archives of Canada, at Ottawa, The State University Library at Albany, New York, The Archives Department at Toronto, Ontario, Libraries in Kings County, Brooklyn, and various other Libraries have given me much assistance, as the State Historical Library at Des Moines, Iowa. The Genealogical Department of the Los Angeles City Library, The Library of Congress at Washington, D.C., to name but a few, have given much assistance. To all these and to many individuals we owe a debt of gratitude and appreciation.

We do not presume to say the work is complete. Nor to assume amount of material, always seeking the truth. We have been that it is completely accurate, although we have sifted a great afforded access to many Family Bibles, individual family histories, a fine manuscript work by Dr. E. Ross Laughlin, M.D., which gives considerable data about the family of one John Lake, who married Mary Laughlin, of his family. All of the above have granted me permission to quote from their work as it impinged upon my own efforts. To all these we render our thanks and gratitude.

This work has grown beyond our fondest dreams, but we offer to the Family and any who may be interested, these efforts to preserve some record of families who have some right to be perpetuated in our history.

The foregoing deals especially with the Lake family. This leaves other families whose blood runs in the author's veins. For records of the family of William Woods, my maternal greatgrandfather, have come largely from family records, and from my grandmother, who lived in our home when I was just a boy. For the records of the Congdon family, we are indebted to the Reverend George E. Congdon, a Baptist minister, who spent years gathering data about the Congdon family in America, and who has given me the privilege of using such material as desired from "The Congdon Chronicle."

Material regarding the Cramton family, has been gleaned from various publications, regarding the coming of the first ancestor, Dennis Cramton, a bound boy, who was brought to Connecticut and his time sold to pay his passage. Where possible, notation has been made of our sources.

Sources of data about the McMillan family have been meager indeed, and have been gathered largely from publications regarding this ancient family. This has been supplemented by family recollections and from our mother, who knew the most about my father. Many years ago, Father had some correspondence with the founders of the Macmillan Publishing Company, in which they set forth his relation to the family. Unfortunately this correspondence was lost, as its real value was not recognized after the death of our father.

We do not presume to say this record of our people is full, and in some particulars may not be exactly correct, but we have tried to separate the truth from mere tradition.

So we send this volume forth in the hope that the message it tries to bring may serve to render some service in showing, "the pit from which we were digged." For whatever of value there is therein, we assure the reader we have had much satisfaction in seeking out, and bringing together, the data we here present.

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
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



I shall keep your inquiry in mind and shall transmit to you any data I can find, but felt I must write now, even tho so unsatisfactory, as it is.




Am hoping to have my manuscript ready for the Publishers early in 1953. Am being crowded to close the record and submit it early this year.

Your letter of Feb,5th. at hand and I note what you say of the records you have at hand. Am wondering if the Lake Family, record you have is the same as that written by Dr E. Ross Lauchlin, formerly of near Kingston, but now with the Vetrans Hospital Service in Massachusetts.

I have had much correspondence with Dr Lauphlin, some of whose people intermarried with the Lake and Stover Families. He did not have but one copy left, and was not willing to sell that. But I was able to borrow one from a member of The Lake Family. Dr Lauphlin did give me permission to use such data in his book as I wished. Too, he sent me many excerpts from his work before I was able to borrow a copy.

Am well aware that it is asking much, but would you be willing to loan me your book on The Lake, Stover, families, together with the listing of cemeteries? I would be willing to pay postage and insurance on them, together with any fee you might require.

I put it this way because another member of the widely flung Lake Family sent to me insured, a quantity of material his Father had been gathering through the years. He is with The DuPont People at Wilmington, Delaware. Then he wrote me that he was coming to Los Angles on business for his firm, and would visit me here in Long Beach. This he did and we had a real talk over family matters, in the course of while he let it out that before being willing to send this material to a stranger, he had had a client of his firm in Los Angles, check upon me, and their responce was entirely favorable. I did not know when or by whome.


I may say that through this material I have been able to push the Lake Family much farther back than previously, and to connect them with Sir Edward Lake, who came to Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1631, then returned to England and somewhat later died. John Lake, who had married Margaret Snider, in New Jersey, before coming to Old Albany Co, in New York, with his family, settled at Ernestown in the Counties of Lennox and Addington, Ontario, in the late 1700ds. Some of his childred were married prior to their coming to Ontario. There were five son's of this John Lake, U.E.Loyalist. They were, Thomas, Nicholas, John, Jr, James and Christopher. There were also three daughters, namely, Elizabeth, Mary, who married James Take, Jr, and Margaret, who -m- Col. James Parrott, who settled on Lot 26, in the first concession, at Ernestown.

James Lake -m- Margaret Hagerman-Lucas, by whome he had his family, BEZXEX. ZM- of eight children.

I am writing A HISTORY OF MY PEOPLE, which includes the Lake Family, as my Grand Mother was Caroline Lake, dau of John Jacob Lake. His first Cousin James Lake, Jr, fell in with The Young Brothers, Brigham, Hiram, etc, and entered the Mormon Church, coming to Ohio, and with his sons, aiding in the building of their first Temple. The family of this James Lake is a large one, and the Lake Family of Utah are much interested in the work I am doing as it will include their ofamily.

I shall be very grateful for such aid as you can give me, regarding early members of these families, in the Bay of Quinty teritory, as they settled in that vicinity.

A Brother of John Lake, Thomas Lake, by name, and also an U.E.Loyalist, came to Ontario about the same time, but he settled at or near Wolford, in Augusta Twp, Greenville, Co. Ontario.

The connecting links between the earliest Lake settlers in America and the present Lake descendants is are sometimes broken. Also immigration has brought other Lakes to our shores from time to time especially in the nineteenth & twentieth centuries. There are many Lakes scattered all over United States & Canada. Many of them had large families and lived to a very old age.

There is a large branch of the Lake family in the State of Indiana. They hold reunions & have a written family history. Write to Dr.G.N.Lake, M.D. at Pleasant Lake, Indiana for data about this family.

There are many Lakes living in New Jersey and the New England States. This branch of the family has annual reunions & a written family history. For data about this branch write Professor Arthur Adams, Trinity College, Hartford, Conn.c/o Librarians Office.

The first mention of Lakes in America was THOMAS LAKE who was granted a strip of 40 miles of land along the Kennebec River.He was the joint owner of Arowsick Island with Capt.Thomas Clarke of Boston but unfortunately Thomas Lake was killed by the Indians on Arowsick Island on the morning of August 14,1676.Arowsick Is.is on the east side of the Kennebec River opposite Fort Popham.This Thomas Lake was a brother of Sir Edward Lake, Erbyin,Lincolnshire,England.

Strange to say, there were two other Thomas Lakes in Boston at about this time. One was a tailor and the other a prominent merchant.

Another THOMAS LAKE came to America with the second immigration in 1640. He joined the Church is on Oct.20,1640 and in the Dorchester, Mass. Burial Ground is a double headstone, on one side of which is "Thomas Lake, 70 years, deceased Oct.27,1678" and on the other side is "ELS LAKE, aged 80 years, deceased Oct.20,1678".

It is also on record that the wife of Henry Lake suffered for witchcraft in Dorchester, Mass, in 1704.

The first town patent of Gravesend, Long Island, was granted by Governor Kieft, Dec. 19, 1645 to, Lady Moody, Sir Henry Moody, and 39 associates, among whom were, John Lake, Thomas Spicer and others.



Concession Sidney Twp. JAMES LAKE (son of John Lake Sr.)-Residence Ernest Town.-He joined Colonel Peters Corps in Gen. Burgoynes army in 1777 as a private and was taken prisoner the same year and remained a prisoner till peace in 1783. He emigrated to Upper Canada in 1893 where he received 200 acres of land. On Oct.3, 1797 he petitioned for more land stating he had a wife and three children born before 1789, viz. John, Jane, James.

Jane Lake married her cousin, Benjamin Lake, son of John Lake Jr. before the year 1805, at which time she petitioned for Crown lands. James Lake, son of James Lake, petitioned for land on Jan. 1809 stating he had attained the age of 21 years.

James Lake Sr. received land grant, Northumberland Co. on Nov. 17, 1797.

CHRISTOPHER LAKE (son of John Lake Sr.)-residence Ernestown-Was a soldier in the Loyal Rangers-Order in council 17 Nov.1797-200

On Nov. 8, 1797 he had three children, viz. John, Sarah & AARON.


In Feb.1807 he again petitioned for lands saying "Your petitioner and family have constantly resided in the Province since 1795, your petitioner served in Burgoynes campaign in 1777 and was taken prisoner a few days before the convention at Saratoga. Your petitioners distressed circumstances prevented him from coming into this province at an earlier period. Your petitioners family consists of seven children, the youngest being now of the age of 16 years." He was recommended for 300 acres as a military claimant. The following children are known:-

AARON LAKE (son of Christopher) petitioned for land on Jan.24,1810 at which time he said he had attained the age of 21 years.

Christopher Lake received land grant June 30,1801, Northumberland Co.In Feb. 1807 he received an additional 300 acre grant.

JOHN LAKE Sr.- John Lake & his wife & two servants received a grant of land 3% d.concession, Sydney Township, Hastings Co.on Aug. 10, 1801.

They received also lot 16,4th.concession Ernestown on Aug. 10, 1801.

They received also west half lot 24, fourth concession Ernestown township on May 1812.

Later he received lot 22,9th.concession,Haldimand township,Northumberland County.

NICHOLAS LAKE married Catherine Hartman daughter of Lodivick Hartman. This Nicholas is the son of John Lake Jr. Catherine Hartman received a grant of lot 13, on 13th.concession of Medonte on Nov. 3, 1836.

AARON LAKE, son of Christopher Lake, received a grant of lot 19,8th.concession Reach Township, Ontario County, on Aug. 25,1810.

MARGARET LAKE (daughter of John Lake Sr.)-she married Daniel Parrott. She applied for a grant of land in Feb. 1836 and was granted 200 acres.

MARGARET LAKE of Ernestown wife of Daniel Parrott Lake applied for a grant of land in Feb.1836 and was granted 200 acres. The identity of both Margaret Lake & Daniel Parrott Lake are unknown.

JABEZ LAKE of Caledon, Ont. married Sally Frank, daughter of William Frank, of Caledon.-She was formerly of Williamsburg. She applied for a grant of land in Dec.1832. The identity of Jabez Lake is not known but he may be a son of Thomas Lake who lived in Grenville County.

JOHN LAKE married Jane Crum daughter of Benoni Crum and they lived in Trafalgar Township, Halton Co. Jane Crum received a grant of lot 1,7th. concession, Oro township. Simcoe Co. on May 10,1834. The identity of this John Lake is not known.

SEBINE LAKE of Burford in Oxford County received grants of land on Oct.24,1835. The identity of Sebine Lake is not known.

NICHOLAS LAKE of Kincardine, Bruce County, received a grant of land on Apr.28, 1853. The identity of this Nicholas Lake is not known.

Dear Doctor:-

You will have come to the conclusion that I am an ungrateful person, that at the least I might have acknowledged your letter of Sept. 4th, that awaited my return to Long Beach. Wekk, frankly am ashamed at the delay and will not spend your time by a long explanation, save to say, first our youngest son returned from Iowa with his family, and me as we came to California again. He formerly lived with me here. He is the Son who was a P.O.W. of the Japs and was in Japan forty two months. Is afflicted with Beri Beri and it has not yeilded to treatment thus far, so his Doctors advised that he return to a warmer climate and wanted him near the great V.A. Hospital here in Long Beach.

Well, have been helping him get settled, buying a home, etc, and etc. BUT, have not been idle as to your problem, as to which Lake married a Randolph, and have had inquiries afloat asking for help. BUT, others have been as slow about replying as have I. Still I have good hope of getting the desired information. Shall report as soon as it reaches me, if ever. I do not find in my records the information you desire, but am reaching for same.

Now may I answer your first question in your note as above. My trip has been amazingly fruitful. Besides the data secured from you, and from others as well as cemetery records in Ontario, will require some time to digest and get into my records. Am working at this as fast as I can.

I came from Kingston to Hoosic Falls, where live other Lakes of our Kin. Decendents of the families who were granted large tracts of land in Washington and Rensler Counties in New York.

Upon the living room wall of one of these I found, framed under glass, the original parchment of the grant of five thousand acres of land lying in what is now Washington County. My Cousin's daughter in law had been a typist, so we removed this parchment from its frame and I read and interpreted same and she typed it out for me, then we re-read and corrested her record and she re-wrote it, so it is complete and readable, yet with all the original spelling and queer marks throught the record. This should be in some great library what it would not be endangered by fire, etc. BUT, droubt if my Cousin would agree to part therewith, NOW.

Too, she loaned me a mass of original material. Some parchments, deeds, bills of sale, accounts, agreements as betwene The Lake's and others. Of these I have had copies made and some photostated, as dificult to copy. These give the divisions of land granted to The Lake's and others. Aarent Van Courlaer was the brother-in-law of John, Thomas, James and Nicholas Lake, each of whome recieved a thousand acres.

Garrett Lake, son of James, of Nicholas, of John, Jr, of John, of Gravesend Long Island, lived on their part of this grant, and with his wife and two daughters are buried thereon, in the door yard of the home. During this year this grave yard has been restored, the lot filled in, cement slabs laid over, each grave, then the high slab grave stones were laid in this cement, so will be premanent. Some of the slabs were cracked or broken. \_Now all can be readily read. About this grave yard is a permanent fence, with posts of sawn slate, with holes bored through these posts and  $l_{t}^{\perp}$  in rods passed through, with a place of opening on one side.

Near this grave yard is an old house built by the Indian chief who had previously owned a part of this land. I have a copy of the deed from this Indian Chief to the British, who then granted it to The Lake's & Van Courlaer This was-a frame house, the lumber having been cut with broad axes. I saw sheeting planks eighteen inches wide, as well as all the frame lumber. This house was built in 1711, and the signature of The Chief of The Owl Tribe is carved on the mantle. I have a rub of this signature.

There is a family now living in this house and it is being restored as it originally was, and will be endowed as a permanent memorial. When on the Battlefield of Bennington, you doubtless saw the Base:Relief of the Battle Field. Well, this old house is the only one shown upon that plan of the Battle. It stands upon a hill about as high as the hill upon which the battle was fought. At the time of that battle, Abraham Lake lived in the house.He also was a son of Nicholas Lake, of New Jersey, and this was James Lake's allotment.

The Battle of Bennington was fought upon this five thousand acre grant. I do not yet know upon which of the Lake's allotment this was, but hope to learn. At least ames allotment is near at hand.

Nearly all of the children of John Lake, of Ernest Town were born at White Creek, in this grant of land.

Then there was a second grant of ten thousand acres, granted to other's of the son's of Nicholas Lake, his sons-in-law and others, whose sons or daughters married into the Lake family, as did Aarent Van Courlaer, who -m-Mary Lake. So far as I have been able to learn, Aarent Van Courlaer and Mary Lake left no issue.

This Van Courlaer was the third of his name. His father was called, almost a god by the Indians, while his grand Father Aarent Van Courlaer founded Schenectady, Ny, and the third Van Courlaer was born two years before the first massacre at Schenectady. His father was drouned in Lake Van Courlaer, which is now called Lake Champleign-not sure this is the spelling--

I stood beside the grave of this Van Courlaer, who -m- Mary Lake, whereon the gravestone it relates that he died in his lo7'th year. This small grave yard is not far from White Creek, N.Y.

The present owner of The old Lake Home is a writer, who is restoring the old house whith loving hands and plans to endow it so it will be a permanent memorial. He has a statement made by the Archetect and Engineer who cast and placed the memorial on the hilltop of the Battlefield, stating that it was the only house standing at the time of that battle.

In that battle was on the British side, John Hogle, who had -m- Margaret Lake and had two son's, Sebastian and James, who later recieved his pay and settlement, and who lived with their uncle James Parrott. I have some record of the family of this Sebastian Lake, who had a nickname, as you, perhaps know.

On the side of the Colonies in that battle was my ancestor on my Mothers side, who was Neriah Cramton, one of the founders of Vermont, and who, with his eldest son Neriah Cramton, was at the Battle of Lake Erie. My Mothers Father, Peter Cramton was the fourteenth child of Neriah Cramton and Margaret Wallace, who was of the same family as Lord Corn Wallace--who by the family was dubbed cob wallace. Strange how these lines converge.

Then Dorcas Lucinda Woods, who -m- Peter Cramton, was a dau of William Wood a decendant of James Woods who came to Massachusets Bay colony in 1636. She was Mother to my Mother, Olive Cramton-Mc Millan. Their record I have completed.

Dennis Cramton, the first of the name to come to America, came as a bound boy in 1636, later became a freed man, and a large property holder in Mass, but whose family went to Vermont. A daughter of thid Dennis Cramton-mone who became head of The Scribner Family, great publishers.

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-3-My Cousin, Mrs Amity "ake-Quackenbush's husband was a decendant of the Quackenbush who was one of the grantees of the ten thousand acre grant of land, which lay directly south of the five thousand acre grant, in what became Rennsler County, and the line betwene that and Washington County, is the division betwene the two grants.

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This cousin drove me all over that country, explaining all points as we drove. While upon the battlefield, I came near passing out--although she knew nothing of that. Thought I would have a stroke there, but managed to get back into her car, without attracting attention, but was I glad she was driving. By the time we reached the old Indian Chief's house, I was able to get about and see what was interesting, and hear again the story of the house. Later I was in and all over the old house several times.

If you have had the courage to read this far, you will understand what I was doing while about White Creek and Hoosiac Falls, those days. Of course I also met many others of the KINSFOLKS, who are much interested in my task.

Dr Arthur Adams did not know about all this when he wrote ,with his Cousin Sarah Risley; "The Geneology of The Lake Family." Now out of print, but a very valuable volum. He just did not have the 'anadian Royalist Lake's right. What he had was from The Rev. John N. Lake of Toronto, as he states in his book. Now he is urging me to complete my record, and has promised to write a foreword thereto.

In his book, he says it was not sure whether the original John Lake, of Gravesend married Anne Spicer before coming to the Colonies or afterwards. But only withing the past few days I have the record that they were -m- in 1649. When I learned of the date of baptism of their first child, John Jr, in 1651-I wondered what they were doing all the years since first arriving in 1636. Too, my correspondent states that this John Lake--while one of the founders of Gravesend-- lived in the home of Thomas Spicer before his marriage so it would seem that both he and Anne were but young children, as girls usually married as soon as they reached sixteen or eighteen and the boys as soon as the gorls were willing. The date of their marriage is thus, revealing.

Their first son John Jr, or Jan as shown in the Bap. records, had as children, --he -m- Neeltje Claessen--i-Jan, bp. April 16,1688; ii-Daniel, bp. April 25,1696, (whome Dr Adams has as ancestor of the Canadian Royalist Lake's ), ii-Thomas., iv-Nicholas, who was actually ancestor of The Royalist Lake's as well as many others; and v- Mary, -m- Cornelius an Sicklen. (see page-10of Dr Adams book.)

Dr Adams follows his line through William Lake of Great Egg Harbour, in Old Glouchester County, N.J.the vi-child of John Take and Anne Spicer-Lake, whose record he deals with specifically, and who form the group who hold The Lake Family Reunions at Ocean City, etc. in N.J. & of which Dr Adams is Secretary.

Then Mr Devereaux Lake-then of Ohio, but now living at Altedena, Califand whome I frequently visit, and who has given me much help and inspiration) wrote a fine history of the Southern Lake Family, who decended through Richard Lake, of Hunterdon Co, N.J. and so back through William , to John Lake, of Gravesend, L.I. This, too, is a fine volum, well illustrated, and published at Loraine, Ohio, for private distribution. Now out of print and un-obtainable

NOW, we hope, will soon come the third volum, which will deal in much detail with the Canadian Lie of The Lake Family as well as with other of my Kncestors. I have five families whome I trace to the middle sixteen thirties.

However the Canadian Royalist Lake Family does not come through Daniel Lake, of John, of Gravesend, L. I., who was one of the founders of Staten 'sland who have furnished many Lake's of conciderable note. Dr Adams and Sarah Risley deal with this family to some extent, but its histroy has never really been written. How fine it could be, should some member of that family, get THE URGE, to perpetuate their line in history.

A recent article on Staten Island, in The Satuarday Evening Post, had something to say about the founders of Staten Island and mentions the Line

Now this answer to your of Sept-4th. is late, but is trying to catch up on some Lake record, at any rate.

From Hoosiac Falls, I drove on to Wilmington, Delaware, as'another Cousin I met at Hoosiac Falls, and who ,too, is much interested in my quest, said he would check everything he could find in The City Library at N.Y.City, and which he has done. By the way he is a Scintist of conciderable note, as a Chemist who has worked on THE BOMB.

I wended my way to Wilmington, Delaware, where another Cousin is in an important position with The Du Ponts organization. He has been greatly in-

terested in my work, since becoming inoculated with what I am attempting. "e asked"who is going to publish your book?" I had to say I did not know, as several firms were interested therein. He said there was a man in the same building as he, who directed all the printing and publishing busin-ess for the Du Ponts. He called him, explained at some length, what I was attempting and was told to reach the General Manager of Scribners in New York, and say he sent him, and so put the matter up to him. This Mr "ake did, reached him, talked for some fifteen minutes, then I was asked to get on the phone and we talked at conciderable length. Asked when I hoped to have the manuscript ready, then was told to send it direct to him, with a covering letter relating our conversation and all about our conversation, then they would give serious concideration to its publication.

Had I gone direct to their office, I would have barely gotten inside the door, and been told the Manager was in conference etc and etc, and probably could not be seen at all, as they were having manuscripts offered every day and probably would not be interested. BUT, reaching him through Du Ponts, I got an immediate connection and responce, as well. Was much incouraged.

Since returning I have been as busy as time would permit, working into my manuscript the data obtained from yourself and many others-which is some task-as the connection must sometimes be saught, before being written in. Such as dates from gravestones, etc. I have thr second, but must determine who is involved and whose son James, etc was, as there are many of the various names, all through the record.

I have been able to prove that the Jacobus of Nicholas, involved in the 5,000 acce grant is the James of the grant. Tave a copy of his will, in which both Jacobus and James are used of the same person. Too, that Garrett of White Creek, N.Y. cared for his fathers interests, as James did not remove to N.Y. but did own much land in N.J., while Garrett cared for his interests in .N.Y. and died there. This Amith Lake-Quackenbush, of Hoosic "alls, N.Y. is of his decendents as well as two men I had as parishioners in Iowa, of her family, who go back to Garrett Lake, of White Creek. N.Y. So my work goes on and becomes more facinating all the time.

As soon--if I can get definite word as to your connection, I shall not wait as long before sending you word. Too, shall work out for your records much that I already have in hand.
