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### History of the SniderFamily.

This is a historical sketch of our branch of the Snider family in Canada, and how we being from German ancestry, came to be identified with the United Empire Loyalists.

Back in the seventeenth century, when Protestant England overthrew the Stuarts, William Prince of Orange was invited to the British throne as William III. This created a very strong friendship between the German-speaking provinces and England.

Again, in 1714 Queen Anne died without an heir, but the royal line was continued through another branch of the camily, that of Sophia of Hanover. She had a son George Louis, and in order to keep the British throne Protestant, he was invited to rule as George I. This further cemented the friendship, so that when in the reigh of George III during the American revoluation, 1774-1778, Britain being short of trained soldiers, the Duke of Hesses sent the Hessian Guards as a separate unit with its own officers to America to operate under a British Commander. These Hessian soldiers took the oath of allegiance and fought with the British all through the war.

After the war the Hessians were disbanded. About half of them returned home, and the remainder settled in Pensylvania and New York States. Many of these disbanded Hessian Guards showed their loyalty to Britain by following the British Loyalists to Canada where they had gone at the conclusion of the war, settling in Upper Canada near Fort Frontenac (Kingston) at Adolphustown, near Bath, Addi ngton County, north of the Bay of Quinte.

These Hessians, having taken the eath of allegiance, received off Britain their script for land and settled in the south and eastern portion of Prince Edward County, in what is now known as Cressy. They had to wait until the government made a new survey on the south side of the Bay of Quinte. They arrived about ten years after the first British Loyalists.


Among these Hessian Loyalists were the Sniders, Dingmans, Minekers, Bougards, Huyckes, Pruyners, and others. Representing our family was Doctor Schneider who had been a military surgion in the Hessian Guards. He was born at Hesse Cassel about 1750 and when he sailed from Hamburg he left only his sisger weeping on the wharf. He never saw her again. He had a brother who came to America, and after the war, to Canada, but all trace of him was lost as the whole country was bush, and communication was difficult. There are a number of Sniders in York County, near Toronto, who have a family resemblance, and may be offsprings of this brothers.

Dr. Schneider brought his wife to Canada and settled montherized among the other Loyalists. He died early in the last century, and his wife who had been born at Hanover lived to be over a hundred years of age. She lived with her son Tobias Snider on the old homestead. I can remember the little old lady sitting in her big arm chair, although I was only five or six years old. I have heard father say that she used to receive letters written in German addressed "Schneider".

All the German names in time became Anglicised, because the English Loyalists could not, or would not, try to spell the German, so our name became "Snider".

Dr. Snider had three sons, Ernest Henry, Tobias and John and two or more daughters. One daughter I know married Richard Huff. Father used to call Col. Henry Dingman "Uncle Henry" so he must have married another daughter.

A most important thing took place which shaped the destiny of all the United Empire Loyalists in Upper Canada. In about 1765 a number of Irish Methodists had sent out to America by John Wesley. After the war some of these Methodists, under the leadership of Phillip mbury and his sister Barbara Heck, came to Canada and a



great revival took place. Nearly all the pioneers came under the influence of this wonderful "Penetcost", and that is why all these Loyalist Families and their descendants were such strong Methodists. Wherever you find any of their off-shoots you find loyal, faithful Christians. That old time religion seems to have reached to their children, and their children's children, like an old promise being fulfilled.

Dr. Snider's son Erenest Henry, my grandfather, was a Methodist preacher with more than ordinary ability. One writer of note has said of him, "That grand old patriarch of Christ likeness whose religious zeal and Godlike life did so much for the establishment of Christianity in primitive life of Upper Canada."

This information has been obtained through several years of enquiring, correspondence early recollection, and history.



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
My Dear Dr. Burleigh:

While waiting to receive papers from my distant relative in Saskatchewan to confirm what I had told you about Johannes Joost Snider and Anna Magdalena Elizabeth Flagler, I received a summons to make myself available for Jury duty. Soon, I found myself involved on a Public Institutions Inspection panel, which was very time consuming, but at the same time, very rewarding. Now, finally, my relative has sent me the document I want to give you, and I have been looking forward to writing you before I get involved in the campaign of our local candidate.

Secondly, your two letters were received here, and I just don't know how to express my thanks to you for the information they contained. Every time I hear from you is a special event. I'm glad you found some data on Johannes' wife. The Mormon Archive Record I have enclosed confirms your information. I do thank you so kindly for copying these many items of interests from the books in your library. You asked me to see if I could sort out some of the data you sent on Flagler, and I have tried to do just that. Please check it and see if you agree.

The Mormon sheet is a wealth of information, and I am hoping that my sending this will in some way make up for my tardiness in replying. I am going to pursue this Mormon thing a bit further. I will write and see if they have a record on "Hannes of Johannes SNYDER" and "LIESBAETH or Elizabeth MEYER". We have nothing to lose, I'm sure.

I used to correspond with a lady who was a descendent of Abraham, son of Simon, and another one whose husband was a descendent of Isaac, son of Simon. I was so overwhelmed when you told me you might publish a pamphlet on the SNIDERS, I have been making lists of what I can do to help. I have pulled a few things from my files, and will get in touch with these two ladies and see if we can use what they have. I have much more information, of course, mostly about the last three or four generations. If you can use it, just say the word. My husband suggested that we come to Kingston some Sunday and show you what I have. What can I do for you, Dr. Burleigh? I want to help.



I also have a copy of Zechariah's (son of Simon) discharge papers, and his application to have his name placed on the United Empire Loyalist List so that his children may receive Crown Lands. I am sure that there is much more I could do, but I really don't know where to start. I had been making some inquiries from laymen about publishing the data I have, but somehow, it didn't seem complete without knowing the origin of the Sniders in Germany. A lot of my relatives have asked me when I plan to publish, so maybe this item would sell. I presume that I have understood you properly, that you would publish this pamphlet to sell. Will you please let me know what is involved.

I have copies of other documents such as Mary Miller Snider's (daughter of Jacob Miller) petition for crown lands, and deeds to Jacob Snider's (son of Zechariah) property in Camden township.

I could kick myself for not going on those trips with the Bay of Quinte Chapter, to the Mohawk valley, etc. Next time, for sure.

Dr. Burleigh, will you please have a look in your Spring, 1975 copy of the Loyalist Gazette. On page 14, H. Elgin Snider of Box #659, Gravenhurst has requested Snider information. I visited him one time and concluded that his family was not connected with mine. However, it is possible that it may be. What do you think. Perhaps we should steer clear of this guy? I never ever sent him a copy of my tree. I note that he mentions a Baltus Snider. Johannes had a son Baltus. He also mentions Flagler in his Kings County New Brunswick Sniders. I note that there is a Flagler from Florida who is a member of Bay of Quinte Chapter. Do you know him?

The only thing I plan to do at present, is write to the Mormon Library. I will not contact the other ladies who are descendents of Simon until I hear from you.

I am looking forward with great interest to your next letter.



## Says Nonagenarian On Birthday

When Mrs. William Ferguson was born Jennie Snider on her parents' farm in Portland Township, in Portland Township, Canada was still a young nation just approaching its 20th birthday. For Harvey Snider and his wife Mary, young Jennie's birth added another link in a family circle which eventually numbered 10 children. "They raised him families in "They raised big families in those days and I did too when I got married," said Mrs. Ferguson when The Beaver interviewed her last

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On Sunday, March 6, Mrs. Ferguson celebrated her 90th birthday at the Slash Road home of her son and daughter in law, Mr. and Mrs. Everton W. Ferguson. It was a proud family occasion indeed with over one hundred people present during the afternoon reception held in her honor. Sixty-two of those who came to wish her well were her direct descendants. Some came from as far away as California, others from nearby or various parts of Ontario and New York

There were five generations present at the

party. They included Mrs. Ferguson's eight children, 24 grandchildren, 28 great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren. For a person who counts her children as the greatest blessing of her life it was a very happy occasion.

Mrs. Ferguson lived only six years of her life in Frontenac County, the remaining 84 years up to the present have been in Lennox and Addington County, with most of it spent in Denbigh Township where her parents farmed and where later, after her marriage to William Ferguson in 1903, she and her husband also farmed and raised their family. After they retired from farming, they moved to Morven, and lived there until her husband's death a few years

Now Mrs. Ferguson lives with her son George at 481 William Street in Napanee. Although bothered by arthritis she still manages to share in household tasks and finds time every day to read her Bible. "I couldn't live without that," she said.

Keen and alert, though she doesn't get out and around as much as she used to, she appears to have taken in her stride the many changes and developments which have taken place in the world around her throughout the span of her lifetime. She does feel though that the lifestyle of her younger days gave greater satisfaction from work and just living than it does today. 

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
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
